#### Tips to Stay Safe at Home

#### Assess mobility needs in and around the home

- · Remove trip hazards.
  - a. De-clutter, remove loose carpeting/rugs or secure with double sided rug tape.
  - b. Mark any steps or changes in floor level with tape or paint in a high-contrast color.
  - c. Remove or secure any electrical or cable cords that might be tripped on.
- · Are stair rails secure, weight bearing?
- · Assess the need for ramps and stair-lifts.
- · Do any doorways need to be widened for wheelchair/walker?

#### Bathroom safety and accessibility

- · Does the shower/tub area need grab bars installed?
- · Would they benefit from a shower chair or transfer bench?
- · Does the toilet need a surround rail or riser?
- · Turn water heater down to reduce scald risk.

#### Communication

- · Would a doorbell camera or intercom be useful?
- · Do they have a way to keep a phone with them at all times?
- · Would a personal alert system be appropriate?

#### General safety and convenience considerations

- · Store items within reach, do they need a reacher/grabbing device?
- · Smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, set a maintenance schedule to check and change batteries.
- · Ensure home has adequate lighting.
- · Do any areas need a non-slip mat?
- · Replace standard doorknobs with lever handles.
- · Do any stairways need non-skid treads?
- · Ask your Home Health Care company if they can perform a Home Safety Assessment.

#### **Basic Oxygen Concentrator and Supply Maintenance**

#### Clean the outside of the oxygen concentrator.

- It is recommended to clean the outside of the concentrator weekly.
- · Begin by unplugging the oxygen concentrator from its power source.
- · Vacuum vents to prevent air flow obstruction.
- · Wipe down the concentrator with a soft damp cloth in a solution of mild dish washing soap and warm water.
- · Let the concentrator air-dry or dry with a lint free cloth before plugging into a power source.

#### Stationary and Portable Oxygen Concentrator Filters

- · External Particle Filters: Clean your external particle filters weekly by rinsing them with warm water and let them air dry.
- · Internal Filters: You can request internal filters for the Stationary and Portable every two years.

#### Suggested Timeline for Changing O2 Supplies

#### Nasal cannulas/masks

· Replace weekly.

#### Ear cushions and swivel connectors

· Replace monthly.

#### Water traps

- Every day, or as needed, twist/pull water trap tube open to empty it.
- The placement of the water trap should be next to the nasal cannula not near the humidifier bottle.
- · Replace monthly.

#### **Humidifier bottle**

- · Only use distilled water.
- · Weekly wash the humidifier bottle with soap and warm water.
- · Replace humidifier bottle monthly.

#### Green extension tubing

· Replace every other month.

#### Additional Tips

- · Do NOT submerge the concentrator in water.
- · Do not place liquids near your concentrator.
- · Keep concentrator 6-12 inches away from walls, furniture, and curtains to maintain airflow.
- · Keep away from heat or open flame.
- · Don't smoke or allow others to smoke near an oxygen concentrator.
